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Meeting Summary (Action Minutes) Humboldt County Fire Safe Council Meeting January 24, 2019

A Humboldt County Fire Safe Council (HCFSC) meeting was held on January 24, 2019 at the University of California Cooperative Extension office, 5630 South Broadway, Eureka. The HCFSC was appointed by the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors (BOS) to guide maintenance and implementation of the Humboldt County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP).

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AGENDA ITEM SUMMARIES

1. Call to Order – Welcome, Introductions, and Agenda Review

HCFSC Chairperson, Ian Sigman called the meeting to order at 10:00.
Meeting attendees went through introductions.

2. Approval of the meeting Agenda and Minutes from the previous FSC meeting

Chris Ramey motioned to approve the August FSC meeting minutes. Dorie Lanni seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously approved.

3. Public Comments/Announcements/Correspondence

The HSCFSC congratulated Tracy Katelman on her new role as the Executive Director of the California Fire Safe Council.

4. Humboldt County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) Update, Final Drafts: Getting Over the Finish Line

The HCFSC – with the help of consultant Tracy Katelman and support from County staff – has been working toward the publication of the 2019 CWPP for the last two years. A great deal of thanks is owed to HCFSC members and communities that hosted the 2017 community workshops and to the many members, agencies, organizations, and community members that provided invaluable input and feedback. As a result of this hard work and collaboration, the CWPP has been completed and is now being presented to the FSC for certification as meeting the requirements of a CWPP under the Healthy Forest Restoration Act. Notably, the Plan goes far beyond these criteria. The President of the Humboldt County Fire Chiefs' Association and the CAL FIRE Unit Chief have already signed the Plan. On February 5, 2019, the Plan will be presented to the Board of Supervisors (BOS) for the final signature.

The 2019 CWPP is the third iteration of the Plan. It will serve as the HCFSC's work plan over the next five years and is intended to inspire and guide other groups preparing for wildfire, as well. The Plan has already proved to be very useful in applying for a series of grants (see subsequent section).

[Meeting attendees reviewed the handout together, see attachment. Handout includes overview of CWPP contents, the three main criteria of a CWPP, and next steps for implementation.]

Discussion:

Q: Is it still possible to make minor edits?

A: It is possible to make corrections but not substantive changes. The Planning Unit Action Plans (Part 4) are considered living documents and will continue to evolve as communities develop and/or accomplish projects or new information becomes relevant. The associated Web GIS Portal will continue to be actively updated, as well. The Plan, in its current form (save for any corrections made before Feb. 5th), will be printed in mid-February. A log of changes will be added to the plan when it becomes necessary; an internal errata sheet for information to include in the next plan will be kept on file.

Motion: Kai Ostrow motioned to approve the action as stated: **Authorize the HCFSC Chair to sign two original copies of the CWPP certification and agreement signature sheet certifying that the 2019 CWPP Update has adequately met the standards of the Healthy Forest Restoration Act.** Dorie Lanni seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

[HSCFSC Chairperson Ian Sigman signed two original copies of the CWPP certification and agreement sheet.]

5. CWPP Implementation

Each of the six goal areas of the CWPP have a work group. There were a few pressing items for the following groups:

Integrated Planning Work Group (IPWG):

- **Fire Safe Regulation updates (State and County)**

- The State Fire Safe Regulations have recently been updated by the Board of Forestry.
- The County has one year to ensure that the County Fire Safe Regulations meet or exceed the updated state regulations. In the past, the County has included additional items that go above

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and beyond the requirements.

- There is a CWPP action item directing the FSC to ensure best practices and best science are incorporated into County Fire Safe Regulations. Cybelle has been in contact with County Planning and Building about the process. IPWG will take the lead on this action item.
- Point of Information (POI): The Board is looking at doing another update in 2020 given the last fire season. In particular, regulations regarding subdivisions and Local Responsibility Areas (LRA) within high/very high Fire Hazard Severity Zones will be updated. These changes are not anticipated to impact Humboldt County because there is no LRA within high fire hazard severity. It could impact the Titlow Hill subdivision, which currently does not have any official fire protection.
- It would be useful for the work group to get familiar with the regulations now, the process, and get ready to comment on updates coming down the line. A large portion of projected development (and existing) is in high fire hazard severity zones.
- The Board of Forestry will approve changes/additions to Humboldt County regulations.
- [Dorie Lanni volunteered to join this work group.]
- **CAL FIRE Unit plan update – integrate with CWPP priorities**
 - CAL FIRE Humboldt—Del Norte Unit is in the midst of updating their annual plan. The IPWG needs to set up a meeting to review the CWPP and how to integrate it with the CAL FIRE Unit Plan.
 - The State Strategic Fire Plan was updated in 2018. Each Unit now needs to review their Unit Plans for consistency; will also attempt to reorganize for standardization and reduce volume of content. Upon certification of CWPP, CAL FIRE Humboldt—Del Norte Unit will look for highest priority projects and adopt those as the Unit's highest priorities (Note: community-identified projects need to be vetted first). The Unit will work with the HCFSC to further refine those priorities.
 - The CAL FIRE Humboldt—Del Norte Unit Plan will be completed in Spring 2019.

Community Preparedness Work Group:

- **Living with Wildfire in Northwestern California, 3rd Edition**
 - LWW Editorial Committee Meeting today after FSC meeting.
 - The update is moving forward. Edits must be submitted by Feb 15, 2019.
 - The plan is to go to print April 1, 2019. All sponsors will pool resources for printing, along with anyone else who wishes to bulk order. The more we order, the cheaper it will be.
 - The focus of this publication is on education, defensible space, hardened homes, and fuelbreaks.

Restoration of Beneficial Fire Work Group:

- **Discuss hiring process for contractor to assist with Clearinghouse prescribed fire grant project**
 - HCFSC received a grant from the CA FSC.
 - It is linked with a University of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE) project, funded through CAL FIRE, that will be used as match.
 - In general, the HCFSC project will emphasize education and increasing support for prescribed fire, including presentations to inform the BOS and the public. FSC meetings going forward will include presentations/materials that members can then share with their networks.
 - The project will also fund a liaison who will work with Lenya, Area Fire Advisor, in Southern Humboldt to train volunteer fire departments (VFDs) to implement prescribed burns and conduct site visits to prospective property owners who are interested in planning burns on their land.
 - Lenya has been working closely with Kai who did a survey of local fire to see what trainings are needed.
 - Q: Will this grant be expanding activities of the Southern Humboldt FSC (SHFSC)?
 - A: The SHFSC is not specifically called out in the grant scope. The liaison will work between landowners, VFDs, and the Prescribed Burn Association (PBA). Mattole will be included. UCCE's project is countywide; the County is infusing extra support for Southern Humboldt. This grant is an opportunity to bolster existing interest and potential for PBA to be an umbrella under which local groups can work, potentially including SHFSC.
 - These two grants will implement a large portion of the Restoration of Beneficial Fire Action Plan of the CWPP.
 - Funds will become available February 1, 2019.
 - [Chris Ramey volunteered to join this working group.]

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Motion: Mike Lake motioned to approve the action as stated: **Authorize the Restoration of Beneficial Fire Work Group as the contractor hiring committee. Identify additional members, as needed.** Lon Winburn seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Disaster Preparedness Work Group:

- County Office of Emergency Services (OES) is developing a countywide evacuation plan. OES will repeat the process of hosting community workshops used for the CWPP but the focus this time will be on mapping evacuation routes/hazards within the planning units. OES will be collecting information on community profiles, vulnerable populations, and one-way in/one-way out roads and neighborhoods.
- Comment: Someone brought up at a Lower Mattole FSC meeting that they feel it is important that the Sheriff's Department be more involved in evacuation planning.
 - There is a new under-sheriff who is passionate about evacuation planning. We had deputies at the CWPP workshops but we really need lieutenants or the under-sheriff to participate – agreed.
- County has officially established a County CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) and is currently recruiting members, especially people living in unincorporated areas and that have already taken the training. The County CERT can serve as an incubator or umbrella for local CERTs. This has to be volunteer-led effort. Emergency Services Manager, Dorie will be the program manager but will not manage teams directly. If teams are struggling/need guidance/more momentum, OES can help bolster them.
- OES is hiring a Program Coordinator. Pushing to hire full time Grant Manager, as well.
- OES has nearly completed a Mass Care Plan with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), a plan that did not exist two years ago.
- OES is coordinating shelter inspections. The main issue has been ADA compliance, since the County cannot staff a shelter if it is not accessible. If you have ideas for facilities, please get in touch. The County has an opportunity to get free supplies from State Social Services (left over from Carr Fire) but needs somewhere to store them. Please share ideas for storage space.
- Q: Are you reaching out to schools or do you need them to reach out?
- A: We are currently looking for storage and staging areas, and then will look for shelters to disperse the cache to but that could be one year from now.

6. Grant Reports and Funding Strategy

Recently closed grants:

- **CA FSC Clearinghouse 2016 grant** – This grant funded the Fire-adapted Landscapes And Safe Homes (FLASH) program. County staff, under the direction of the HCFSC have begun to pursue funding for a similar program.

Current Grants / Funding

- **SRA** – CWPP Update support
 - It supported the CWPP update (in addition to Title III).
 - The money set aside for printing will be used for this purpose before the grant closes out at the end of February.
- **Title III** – CWPP Update support / Living with Wildfire
 - Title III has provided funding for the CWPP update and the Living with Wildfire update.
- **Measure Z** – Sustainable Fire Services Planning
 - County staff are continuing to work with the Humboldt County Fire Chiefs' Association to address the mismatch between fire service and jurisdictional boundaries. Mike and Lon are on an informal working group with two BOS members, in addition to Justin McDonald. There have been a series of negotiations with CAO, County Planning, LAFCO, and Cybelle that have resulted in agreement about the percentage of property tax that could be shared with fire departments in order to incentivize those departments to annex outlying areas. There are areas of the county where subdivisions are planned or are allowed. However, if these areas are outside of a fire related district, that area cannot be subdivided.
 - A proposal is being developed that provides for various tax sharing offers depending on which of a set of expectations the fire service can meet; expectations fall in the categories of consolidation, long term financial planning, sustainability, and diversifying revenue portfolios.

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- The offers have been tested in the north bay, Redway, and Rio Dell/Scotia.
- A proposal for moving forward will be brought before the BOS at their March meeting.

Grant applications and Future Funding

- **FEMA** – hand around NOI and provide update
 - County staff have been invited to submit a full application after submitting a preliminary Notice of Interest (NOI).
 - The idea is to develop a program similar to FLASH but with a greater focus on defensible space and construction materials/home hardening.
- **CAL FIRE** – hand around grant application and provide update
 - County staff submitted an application that will hopefully result in a burst of CWPP implementation activity. The proposal includes funding for chipper days and defensible space model projects focused in wildland-urban interface (WUI) communities. It will help iron out the process for conducting this kind of work and identify who the contractors and collaborators are so that funding can be fed into an existing program in the future.
 - It will also provide an opportunity to review planning unit action plans and bring them back to their communities for implementation.
 - There is a roadside clearance component as well that may or may not be tied to the demonstration neighborhoods. This will help us work with County Road Maintenance to figure out the process and will fund the purchase of a chipper for the department.
 - Funds will also be used to develop a Hardened Homes in Humboldt County pamphlet.

Funding Plan Development

- Develop a plan for FLASH funding or something similar
 - FLASH is a popular and effective program for fuel reduction and education, historically funded by the CA FSC. However, it is somewhat complicated to fund. Potential ground disturbance triggers environmental compliance when public funds are being used. This can be a costly/lengthy process complicated by the fact that it is not known at the time of application where exactly work will be and when it will occur. It may make sense to scale down the program to focus on defensible space or to pursue funding for environmental compliance and training for FLASH technicians.
 - Program results are highly sustainable because landowners learn how to maintain fire-resilient landscapes around their homes and have made some initial investment.
 - CA FSC needs to work with CAL FIRE to figure out where compliance stumbling blocks are. CAL FIRE recently submitted a survey to regional Chiefs' with suggestions related to similar obstacles that will be sent to the Governor.
- Get a handle on state and federal funding sources/opportunities and how they can be leveraged to implement the CWPP
 - Continue to figure out where HFSC fits in and how to implement the CWPP.

Discussion:

- *[Debra Harris volunteered to join the Funding Committee.]*
- Q: Is there a resource for small volunteer fire departments to learn about relevant funding opportunities (from Palo Verde VFD Rep.)?
- A: This could be something that the funding committee puts together. There was also a suggestion for the VFD to get involved with the Southern Humboldt FSC to track and pursue funding opportunities.

7. State and Regional Meetings and Conferences

- **Report on Forest Task Force meetings** – Jason/Tracy
 - The Forest Task Force includes representatives from local, state, and federal agencies, and Tribes.
 - Their objective is to develop strategies to protect economic and ecological value of CA forests and figure out where the encumbrances to progress are. Their recommendations and findings may precipitate regulatory/policy changes.
 - More specifically, increasing the pace and scale of forest management, finding ways to utilize wood products (not all of which are merchantable).
 - Recent conversations have also included forest conditions, i.e. beetle kill, drought stress etc.

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- Task Force work groups are organized around regulations, prescribed fire, landowner outreach and education, wood utilization, tree mortality, and more.
 - Tracy is in the prescribed fire work group, which is focused on coordination and planning, permitting, smoke management, etc.
- There is a lot of interest and funding being offered at the state level for wildfire mitigation.
- Forest Task Force currently meets monthly. Webinar can be found here: <https://fntf.fire.ca.gov>
- **NW California Community Wildfire Resiliency conference in Sea Ranch**
 - This will be the first of many regional conferences.
 - The conference is Friday, February 8 through Sunday, February 10 and will be focused on peer mentoring/info sharing. Numerous Fire Safe Councils and Resource Conservation District representatives will be in attendance among many others.
 - Bill Eastwood, Dave Kahan, Ali Freedlund, John Summers, Cybelle Immitt, Tracy Katelman, and Julia Cavalli will be in attendance.
- **Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI) conference in Reno** [passed around handout]

 - Dorie Lanni and Cybelle will attend.

8. 2019 Meeting Schedule and Nominations

- **Review, amend as necessary, and approve proposed annual meeting schedule**
 - Consider changes to duration and format of meetings
 - Suggestion: *Individualized Reports* could be more focused on what each work group is doing. *Correspondence* could include updates that can be submitted electronically and provided with the agenda as an attachment and pointed out during the correspondence portion at beginning of each meeting.
 - Identify which Work Group(s) will provide a feature presentation at each meeting in 2019
 - Start thinking about what this might look like. CAL FIRE could present their unit plan or the Integrated Planning Work Group could present on updates to fire safe regulations. For the August meeting, the Restoration of Beneficial Fire Work Group could present on how grant implementation is going.
 - At each meeting, the topic of the next presentation will be decided.
 - **Motion:** Lon Winburn motioned to approve the proposed annual schedule. Mike Lake seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.
- **Request nominations for 2019 Chair and Vice-Chair**
 - Ian Sigman (current Chairperson) was nominated to continue serving as the Chairperson. Barbara Darst (current Vice-Chairperson) was nominated to serve as the HCFSC Vice-Chair once again. A vote will be held at the next meeting.
 - **Motion:** Lon Winburn motioned to approve the nomination of Chair and Vice-Chair. Chris Ramey seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.
- **Discuss FSC member list and potential changes**
 - Potential to invite: timber industry, cannabis industry, CCC, DHHS, RCD, more Tribes (potentially Wiyot)
 - Cybelle will initiate BOS proceedings to nominate Lynn Javier and Eliot Brown to replace Jean Louis.
 - Tom O'Gordon may replace Barbara Darst.
 - The HCFSC invited Lenya to join in her capacity as Area Fire Advisor and Prescribed Burn Association coordinator; she accepted the invitation and Cybelle will initiate BOS proceedings.
 - Send contact information to Cybelle if you think of anyone else.

HUMBOLDT COUNTY COMMUNITY WILDFIRE PROTECTION PLAN

The proposed final draft of the CWPP is the culmination of two years of collaboration among the members of the Humboldt County Fire Safe Council (HCFSC). In addition to the broad range of fire protection and prevention entities represented by the HCFSC, the CWPP update process included extensive communication and coordination with local fire departments and fire safe councils, state and federal agencies, personnel from various county departments, and the general public.

This is the third edition of the CWPP. Since 2006, the CWPP has served as the guiding document for the work of the HCFSC and has been an excellent tool for planning and securing funding for numerous projects that have helped local residents and community groups prepare for the impacts of wildfire. Keeping this plan current and actionable is more important than ever as California faces unprecedented losses of life, property, and ecological values to wildfire.

CWPP Contents:

- **Part 1 – Background and Introduction** provides an overview of what a CWPP is, why it is necessary, the update process, the intended audience, and implementation progress since the 2013 update.
- **Part 2 – Risk-Assessment Summary** summarizes the risk assessment detail contained in Part 5 of the CWPP.
- **Part 3 – Countywide Action Plan** identifies a set of metrics and priority actions to meet the goals and objectives of the HCFSC over the next five (5) years.
- **Part 4 – Planning Unit Action Plans** contains information on local fire risks and preparedness for each of the fourteen (14) planning units within Humboldt County, functioning as a “mini-CWPP” for each. These unit actions plans can be used as standalone plans to guide action in their respective areas of the county and/or to shine a light on existing local community wildfire protection plans. These will be treated as living documents.
- **Part 5 – Risk-Assessment Detail** describes the planning-area context through a qualitative assessment of the factors that contribute to wildfire in Humboldt County, including, without limitation, assets and values at risk, fire history and behavior, response capacity, and community preparedness in the face of wildfire.
- **Part 6 – Appendices** contains background and supporting information for the rest of the CWPP. The HCFSC requested that the main body of the CWPP be streamlined to make it more user-friendly and accessible to a wider audience. However, there are details that the HCFSC did not want to lose; those are now found in the appendices.

A CWPP, as defined by the Healthy Forest Restoration Act (HFRA), is a plan for a community at risk that (1) is developed collaboratively, (2) identifies and prioritizes fuel reduction projects, and (3) recommends measures to reduce the ignitability of structures. The Humboldt County CWPP needs to be certified as meeting these standards by three entities: the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors, the Humboldt-Del Norte California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) Unit Chief, and the Humboldt County Fire Chiefs' Association. Certification of a CWPP by these entities does not constitute plan adoption or approval but does represent the signees' agreement that the contents of the plan conform to the three HFRA CWPP standards.

THE THREE MAIN CRITERION OF A CWPP:

Collaboration:

Significant efforts were made throughout the planning process to collaborate with local, state, and federal land and fire management agencies. The Humboldt County Fire Safe Council (HCFSC) collaboratively guided the planning process; it is made up of members and advisors from local FSCs, the Humboldt County Fire Chiefs' Association (Fire Chiefs), individual local fire departments and companies, the Humboldt County Office of Emergency Services, the Hoopa Valley Tribe, CAL FIRE, Six Rivers National Forest, North Coast Unified Air Quality Management District, and the insurance industry. In addition, community workshops and outreach efforts were designed and conducted to maximize community input into the process.

Prioritized Fuel Reduction:

*The process and policies to support prioritized treatments can be found in **Part 3, Countywide Action Plan. Locally prioritized treatment areas are identified in the Planning Unit Action Plans in Part 4.*** Detailed community-identified fuel reduction project data are stored and maintained in the Humboldt County Web GIS Portal at: https://webgis.co.humboldt.ca.us/HCEGIS2.6_CWPP.

Treatment of Structural Ignitability:

This CWPP recommends measures to reduce the ignitability of structures throughout the planning area. *These recommendations can be found in **Chapter 3.2 Wildfire Preparedness of Part 3, Countywide Action Plan; Part 4, Planning Unit Action Plans; and Appendix H, Living with Wildfire.*** In addition, the community workshops conducted during the development of the Plan served as an important venue to educate the public about reducing fire risks to structures, both through presentations by CAL FIRE and the local fire service, and through the distribution of educational materials.

Next Steps:

Work together to implement the CWPP, using the identified objectives, metrics, and priority action recommendations to meet each of the following six goal areas:

- 1. WILDFIRE IGNITION PREVENTION:** REDUCE HUMAN-CAUSED WILDFIRE IGNITIONS.
- 2. WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS:** INCREASE COMMUNITY RESILIENCE AND ADAPTATION TO WILDFIRE.
- 3. DISASTER PREPAREDNESS:** INCREASE RESIDENTS' ABILITY TO EFFECTIVELY PREPARE FOR AND SURVIVE WILDFIRE.
- 4. FIRE PROTECTION:** SUPPORT FIRE PROTECTION FOR PEOPLE, PROPERTY, COMMUNITIES, AND NATURAL RESOURCES.
- 5. RESTORATION OF BENEFICIAL FIRE:** RESTORE BENEFICIAL FIRE AT THE LANDSCAPE SCALE.
- 6. INTEGRATED PLANNING:** MAXIMIZE INTEGRATION OF PLANNING EFFORTS TO IMPROVE COMMUNITY AND ECOSYSTEM RESILIENCE TO WILDFIRE.
