The Yurok Tribe seeks funds for its upriver volunteer fire department to provide equipment and training for fire fighting volunteers; wages for a part-time administrative staff; and for environmental clean up of previously raided marijuana gardens.

4. *Measure Z* funding is scheduled to "sunset" in 2020. How are you developing a plan for sustainability, including diversification of funding sources, in order for your proposal to carry on without reliance on future *Measure Z* funds?

The Yurok Volunteer Fire Department is working with the Yurok Tribe to find additional grants, work with neighboring agencies to reduce training costs, and continue community fund raising efforts.

Illegal dump cleanup activities will continue with other funding sources such as USEPA Region 9 grants.

5. If this request is for the continuation, or expansion, of an existing program/service, what is the current source of funding for that program/service?

The current source of funding is from the Yurok Tribe and community fund raising. Funding for illegal dump cleanups comes from USEPA Region 9 grants.

The additional funds will help to enhance recruitment for volunteers through the availability of equipment and training for those that participate. As other grants are identified, Measure Z assistance can be utilized as match in for further applications.

The Yurok Tribe seeks Measure Z funding for the Yurok Volunteer Fire Department (YVFD) to sustain home and wildland fire protection for upriver communities and funding for the Yurok Tribe Environmental Program (YTEP) to cleanup on-reservation illegal marijuana grow sites.

This funding is vital for YVFD to obtain the proper, up-to-date fire safety training and equipment for the Fire Chief and all volunteers. Some of the training that volunteers will complete is Overthe-Bank training, CPR, EMT, First Responder, as well as other necessary training in order to continue educating the community about fire safety. Other items this funding will provide are updated turnout gear, fire safety equipment, safety improvements to current firetrucks, to include four new wildland firetrucks, residential smoke alarms and fire extinguishers, and adequate gear for responding to emergencies.

The upper portion of the Yurok Reservation follows the approximately twenty-four miles of one-lane State Route 169 with homes on both sides in small cul-de-sac-like residences, four schools, tribal facilities, and two churches. There is a great need to educate community members on in-home fire safety practices and for surrounding properties. Due to rough, undeveloped terrain, narrow roads, and the extreme rurality of the area, response times from other agencies are often up to one hour. The goal is to create fire safe communities. The YVFD intends to conduct fire safety visits to ensure homes have adequate and functioning smoke alarms and fire extinguishers, as well as educate residents on the use fire extinguishers and the importance of fire safety plans.

In the past years the YVFD has been sustained partially by the Yurok Tribe and community fundraising to provide the minimal resources of equipment, training, and safety gear. These funds by themselves are not adequate to maintain fire trucks, equipment, and safety gear. In the past year the YVFD has responded to fifty calls for service that include medical calls, motor vehicle accidents, structure fires, arson fires and, emergency incidents that occur along the banks of the Klamath River.

YTEP has documented the environmental effects from illegal marijuana cultivation on the Reservation for the past three years through participation in Operation Yurok. The environmental damage documented includes: illegal trash dumps; unpermitted road building and logging/land clearing; septic/bacteria contamination of surface water from outhouses; illegal pesticide use and water diversion. Funds will be used to identify and cleanup some of the most environmentally damaging sites we have found through payment of disposal/tipping fees, personal time, and local travel costs. YTEP has the infrastructure, equipment, and staff to carry out illegal dump cleanups.
