I. QUARTERLY NARRATIVE

A. Results/Outcomes

1. Please describe the Measure Z activities completed.

During 1st quarter of the Measure Z funding from July 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020 the following Measure Z activities were completed.

In this quarter, the FPD School Resource Officer (SRO) assigned to the Eel River Valley continues to work with schools in the ERV. During this quarter schools started their 20-21 school year. With the current pandemic schools ranged from distance learning to classroom instruction with safety protocols in place. The pandemic creates a challenging situation for the schools, students and our SRO. SRO adjusted to the challenges faced with the pandemic and found ways to work with students, parents and school staff. SRO connected with distance learning students through video messages and a Pen Pal Program she started. SRO assisted in conducting home visits to check on students and families, bringing them tools and solutions to assure safe education was accomplished during this pandemic. SRO participated in classroom educational presentation for high school students. SRO organized and partnered with schools, parent groups, local businesses and more to conduct projects at Fortuna and County Schools. These projects encompassed repainting educational playground maps, constructing signs and preparing school campuses for the return of students. SRO investigated and arrested an adult selling drugs and tobacco to students. SRO conducted criminal investigations, addressing crimes occurring on and around our schools. SRO is continually engaging with students, families, school staff and our communities to maintain communication, positive relationships and assure the safety of all. Witnessing all of the ways our SRO conducted outreach and engaged with youth, families, schools and the communities other county SRO's reached out to our SRO for advice and ideas. This speaks volumes to the success of our SRO program.

2. How many people have been served and how.

During the 1st quarter Measure Z funds are continuing to make a positive impact in our department and community. The FPD SRO position continues to make a great impact in the Eel River valley. The SRO serves all schools in the Eel River Valley, serving a student population of over 5,000 youth through various school safety programs, addressing criminal matters and actively assists school staff in conflict counselling regarding bullying and social issues.

3. Who has benefited from the enhanced services.

The Fortuna Community and Eel River Valley schools, continues to see great benefits with the addition of this position of the School Resource Officer. Our SRO has been in the position for over three years, establishing relationships, which aid in preventing and solving many crimes that endanger our youth, educational staff and our communities.

4. What difference did Measure Z funding make in our community and for the population you are serving? Measure Z funding of the School Resource Officer has provided a uniformed police presence in our schools and greatly increased the safety of the ERV school system. Our SRO is very accessible to students and staff and is a positive role model for our youth. Our SRO works with parents and guardians, helping to educate them, providing them the education to address juvenile matters that wasn't readily available prior to our SRO position. Our SRO has found a great need for SRO assistance in services in working with students in need of mental health outreach and has focused much effort in this area, especially with the impacts of the ongoing pandemic. All of the engagement that occurred during this 1st quarter with youth, families, schools and communities that is outlined in the response to question 1 was possible because of our SRO position.

5. Please quantify the long-term impacts of your project. This would be for the entire time period that Measure Z has funded your project.

The Fortuna Police Officer assigned, as the ERV SRO has been Measure Z funded since July 2017. Since the inception of the SRO position, our community and the ERV have seen a direct positive impact. We have established a great dialog between law enforcement, youth and school faculty from Scotia to Loleta. Our SRO has impacted the 5,000 + students in the ERV, has spoken at many school assemblies and has brought much needed school safety training to our school system. Our SRO has taken the lead on coordinating training within the school system with law enforcement. Our SRO is in a position to prevent and solve criminal matters which are directly impacting our youth. Our SRO is an outstanding role model, bridging the gap between youth and law enforcement, which is ever so vital in society these days.

6. Describe any unanticipated impacts of receiving Measure Z funding, positive or negative, not already described above.

The Measure Z funding of the SRO has been overwhelmingly positive. We continue to see the positive impacts of the position. The safety of our youth and schools has greatly increased. With our Country's ever changing climate and many negative things in the media, having our SRO present in the schools, working with the youth is ever so important for maintaining a sense of calm and setting a positive example. With the ongoing pandemic our SRO has made adjustments to continually engage with youth, families, schools and our communities.
